It was heartwarming to see the community coming together at the General Store to access their Starlink Service and keep their caffeine levels up; the Ladies well deserve their accolades! The pub homed and fed evacuees, Flutterbies made and delivered food to the needy. I must also give a special shoutout to Tyalgum Noticeboard for regularly updating their page and helping to lessen the feeling of isolation and responding to inquiries as to our situation, especially from overseas. Kindness is free and can make all the difference!

Take a moment though to consider what you might do differently next time, what you might need for next time and how about making a list and starting a resources box? Due to the on-off nature of cyclone Alfred my own preparedness was stretched and after a week of his dithering I also need a rethink. Remember to collect enough water for several days!

In April we look forward to coming together again for the Anzac Day Dawn service. The TDCA wish to acknowledge and thank local returned servicemen David Coleman, Vietnam Veteran of the Royal Australian Armoured Corp and Jeffery Lyon, Warrant Officer Retired, and their team for organising it on our behalf this year.

Don't forget: we need each other in difficult times and the support shown to our businesses needs to be kept up. Where would we have been without our general store? They supported us brilliantly and we need to regularly support them. Besides, when did you last go into any shop and find the staff singing?!

Cyclone Alfred

A few days before the cyclone was due to strike the NSW Department of Community and Justice opened an Evacuation Centre in Tyalgum Hall on Wednesday 5th March. Two of their staff managed The Centre and did a great job of it. Over the period 11 evacuees attended the centre and accommodation was arranged in the Tyalgum Hotel for up to five nights and two others spent one night in the Evacuation Centre. The Centre was shut down on Sunday the 9th. Downed trees were dealt with by RFS in the village and by locals when they fell further away from the village. The village was cut off from Chillingham, and Murwillumbah for only short periods. The biggest issue was lack of power, phones and internet.

Many thanks to The General Store for opening and for maintaining their generator. This allowed many people who could get to the village to use the store's Starlink for communications, and to grab a coffee, etc., and chat to others. The UHF radio system, that was recently installed, worked well and communication using hand-held radios via the repeater station permitted the outer areas of Tyalgum District to communicate with the village. The Resilience Team, with members living in areas that were cut off from Tyalgum Village, monitored their local communities and their UHF radios and called in for assistance as required. Luckily there were few emergency calls.

Guide to tree removal on private property

In the wake of Ex-Cyclone Alfred, residents might be unsure about what to do around fallen or damaged trees on their private property. Council's tree removal regulations have not changed. Here are some tips to assist landowners. Do you need a permit? In most cases, landowners are required to obtain a permit to remove trees on private non-rural land. However, Council has outlined exceptions for those affected by the storm: . No permit for fallen trees: You do not need a permit to remove trees that have already fallen on your property. Imminent risk trees: If a tree on your property is storm-damaged and poses an immediate risk, Council may grant rapid approval for removal. To apply, send clear photos of the tree showing the damage to treepermits@tweed.nsw.gov.au. Additionally, contact a local Level 3 accredited arborist for an assessment. The arborist should email their findings to the same address. • Pruning guidelines: Minor pruning, up to 20% of the tree's living canopy, does not require a permit. However, it must be performed by a Level 3 accredited arborist and comply with the Australian Standard. • Trees near your house: Trees located within 5 metres of your home may also be removed without a permit. This exemption does not apply to trees on Council property, threatened species, koala food trees or trees over 800mm in diameter at chest height. Need More Information? Personal Hardship Assistance Grants are available

The Personal Hardship Assistance Grant for individuals and families is part of a range of support aimed at helping people recover from this event. It provides emergency financial assistance of \$180 for individuals or up to \$900 per fam<mark>ily to cover essential costs such as</mark> food, clothing<mark>, medicines a</mark>nd emergency accommodation. To be eligible for the grant individuals must reside in one of the declared affected local government areas including Tweed. Anyone who wants to apply for this assistance to do so through the Service NSW website. Once your application is approved, you can expect to see this money in your account within days. Applications will open on Wednesday 12 March and will stay open until 8 April 2025. Disaster Recovery Allowance This allowance is available to individuals who live or work in Tweed and other disaster declared areas and have lost some or all of their income due to the disaster. This allowance offers up to 13 weeks of income support for eligible workers and sole traders depending on their personal circumstances who have suffered a loss of income as a direct result of the event. To be eligible for the Disaster Recovery Allowance, a person's income must have fallen below the average Australian weekly income as a result of the floods. Applications opened on Tuesday 11 March. People can check their eligibility on the Services Australia website at: Natural disaster support (Services Australia). The easiest way to claim is online through myGov. Applicants will need to link their centrelink account. If people need help to claim, they can call the Australian Government Emergency Information Line on 180 22 66. Disaster Relief Grants These grants support those most in need and those least able to return their homes to a safe and habitable condition after a natural disaster such as low-income earners and where the damage is not covered by insurance. Our Hall In A Disaster

While being cut off and experiencing a weather event like Cyclone Alfred is not new to us all here in our beautiful Tyalgum village and surrounds, having government help from the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ) to formally open the Hall as the Evacuation Centre was a first. The role of DCJ activating the Hall as an Evacuation Centre is extensive as they work with the Hall Association to manage the Hall during the time they are there and work with other government and non- government organisations and agencies to bring in to the community whatever help or support is needed by the community during a disaster event.

Since the 2022 floods we have all, not just the hall, been putting things into place to help with the next bad weather event. For the Hall to open as an Evacuation Centre requires a direction from DCJ that they wish to open (activate) the Hall as an Evacuation Centre, which is what happened during cyclone Alfred. DCJ then sent a DCJ staff person (Sonya) to open and manage the Hall. The Hall Association's role was to assist Sonya with any practical Hall related matters. If DCJ did not wish to activate the Hall during the cyclone, the Management Committee would have opened the Hall to provide support to the community as needed. It simply could not have opened as an Evacuation Centre.

The Hall is not equipped with bedding and emergency supplies and under the direction of DCJ and TSC is not expected to have these items as they would be supplied through DCJ if required. As several community members required accommodation and meals, the Tyalgum Hotel offered DCJ accommodation and meals at the Hotel. Some bedding was delivered to the Hall later in the week which was utilised by 2 community members for 1 night as they were unable to access the Hotel accommodation due to a mobility issue. DCJ were on site for 4 nights. Throughout this time the hall management committee were in close contact with Sonya to address any issues that may have arisen, in respect to the Hall, and to check that she was okay. Some teething problems with the new generator meant that Konrad came down at 1:30am Friday and 7am Saturday to investigate. Uki Electrical turned up Saturday Morning, and highly recommended that the Generator not be used due to a Current Fault, it was shut down for safety to all. The RFS thankfully leant their portable generator from Saturday until Sunday afternoon when DCJ closed the Hall as the Evacuation Centre

and Sonya left the Village, as DCJ identified there was no longer a need for the Evacuation Centre to remain open. Ensuring the Hall maintenance is as up to date as possible is a huge ongoing job both financially and regarding the time our volunteers donate, but is well worth it if it means having such a wonderful asset in the community.



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<u>Tyalgum RFS Brigade News</u>

Recent activity

A brief dry spell ended with a bang when Cyclone Alfred arrived. It hit the mainland north of Brisbane on Saturday March 8 and was the first cyclone to directly impact the Northern Rivers since 1974.

There was little wind damage to structures but fallen trees damaged power lines throughout our area.

Tyalgum was without power for about 4 days. It was 11 days before the juice came back on at the end of Pinnacle Road. Phones and internet were also out of action but restored more quickly. The Brays Creek rain gauge recorded 346mm from the 6th to the 10th

Pinnacle Road. Phones and internet were also out of action but restored more quickly. The Brays Creek rain gauge recorded 346mm from the 6th to the 10th inclusive. Springbrook received over 1100mm during the event. The rainfall was spread over a lengthy time and stream rises were not excessive. Most roads remained open throughout. Some fallen trees were rapidly cleared, mostly by local residents.

The general consensus is that we got off lightly. Everyone will take their own lessons from Alfred. Solar power, batteries, generators and Starlink satellite internet seem to be the current disaster must-haves. The effect on insurance premiums remains to be seen.



A new high-clearance Unimog ambulance retrieved a patient from Pumpenbil on Sunday 9 March.

Before Alfred there was a series of serious single-vehicle Motor Vehicle Accidents (MVA's). The first was on the night of Australia Day when three people were trapped after a rollover near Bald Mountain. Police, ambulance, VRA and RFS responded and two helicopters carried patients to hospital. Three other accidents occurred along Tyalgum Road in Eungella. During one the road was blocked for a few hours while a trapped driver was released.

Fire outlook and advice

Hopefully things will now settle down for the winter. The spring should be our next dangerous time. Good rain over the last few years has generated plenty of growth.

Much will depend on the amount of spring rain we receive. Now is the time to be planning fire protection work and getting it done.

The Fire Danger Period has been ended early, as happened last year. However, fires must still be notified to neighbours and the RFS. This can be done online or by calling 1300 632 174.



Mosquito warning for the whole of the Tweed Shire

Mosquitoes only need a small amount of water to breed. To prevent breeding, empty all waterholding vessels around your home. Following the heavy rains from Ex-Cyclone Alfred, Council is urging residents to do their bit to reduce the impacts of

mosquitoes.Council's Pest Management Supervisor Brian Falkner said the wet weather has created ideal conditions for mosquito breeding. "Some mosquitoes only need very small amounts of water to breed," he said."To reduce mozzies around your home, empty all water-holding containers such as buckets, old tyres, poorly–aligned roof gutters and pot plant holders. Don't let your home be a haven for mosquitoes and their larvae." Avoid bites by covering up as much as possible and using repellent on your skin or clothes. Other things you can do include: • Mowing lawns regularly and limiting areas of dense vegetation • Covering all windows, doors, chimneys and vents and other entrances with strong insect screens • Ensuring all openings to water tanks and septic tanks are screened securely • Placing sand or fine gravel in pot plant trays, or flushing them out weekly • Emptying and refilling pet water bowls and bird baths regularly. Kerbside clean up coming - skip the trip to the tip!

Tweed residents - we are coming to you, no need to go to the tip! A Shirewide clean up starts early next week following Tropical Cyclone Alfred. Council will conduct a free residential kerbside collection for yard and tree debris and legitimate cyclone-impacted hard waste from the weather event starting next week. Suburb collection days will be finalised in the coming days and published this to our website and social media channels. Please separate hard and green waste as they will be collected by different trucks. The Stotts Creek Resource Recovery Centre is still closed to the public due to flooding and access limitations. We will advise the community when the facility reopens. Your clean up options: • Free kerbside green and hard waste collection - avoid the tip. • Use your regular green bin service for anything that can fit like leaves, light debris, fronds or unpackaged food waste or your red and yellow bin service for hard waste items that fit. • Stockpile yard and tree debris; or legitimate cyclone/flood impacted hard waste on your kerb but not on the road. Make sure it's not going impede your bin collection too. Use your household bin collections Keep using your regular green, red and yellow bin service. Collections will continue. • Chat with neighbours ask if you can top up their green bin if there is space. The tip - avoid where possible Stotts Creek Resource Recovery Centre remains closed due to limited road access. Council will advise when this opens to the public. • Council asks the community to choose the kerbside pickup and skip the trip to the tip. When the tip opens residents of Tweed Shire Local Government Area Only can drop off free waste from the impacts of Ex-Cyclone Alfred from Saturday 15 March until Sunday 23 March 2025. Residents will need to provide a driver's licence or proof of residency at the weighbridge. • Eligible items included are:-Legitimate flood affected waste from impacted properties - Green waste from storm damage.

Flood waters and your health - know the risks

Residents across the Tweed are being urged to take extra precautions if handling flood waters following recent adverse weather. Dr Valerie Delpech, Regional Director of North Coast Population and Public Health, warned that flood waters could contain harmful substances, including raw sewage and chemicals, and should be avoided. "If you are involved in clean-up efforts, wear protective gear such as boots, gloves, and eye protection, and wash your hands thoroughly afterwards," Dr Delpech advised. "Even minor cuts can become infected, so clean and dress any wounds promptly." Those relying on tank water should check for contamination and use alternative water sources until their supply is confirmed safe. Food safety is another concern. Any food, including frozen goods, that has come into contact with floodwaters should be discarded. "If power is cut for more than four hours, food in fridges is unsafe. Freezers will keep food for around 24 hours if unopened," Dr Delpech said. Other flood-related hazards include hidden dangers in homes, contaminated medicines, and potential electrical risks. Mould prevention is also critical - drying out flooded homes quickly can help reduce health risks. For flood assistance, call the SES on 132 500. 

Mic Julien, President, Tyalgum Recreation Reserve
Prior to all the rain the caretakers were very busy,
especially on the weekends, followed by a very
quiet period until the rain moved on.

Please note that the campground doesn't close over stressful periods. If people had to leave home and could bring a van to the campground, or travelers needed to stop and wait until the weather improved, they would be most welcome.

Our main issue is that when power goes out the amenity blocks can't be used. The sewerage from those blocks is collected in a sump and pumped uphill to the main sewerage lines under Coolman Street, and that requires power. However, lots of vans are self-sufficient for a few days, and the village toilet block is not that far away in an emergency.




